



Pupil Premium at Laithes Primary School 2017/ 2018

The government believes that effective use of Pupil Premium funding, which is additional to the main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children, ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

Schools decide how Pupil Premium funding is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision needs to be made for those individual children eligible for the funding.

Since September 2012 schools have been required to publish online information as to how pupil premium has been used. In 2017-2018 is £285,479 the Pupil Premium allocation to our school is. Our plans for the allocation are outlined in the school's provision map.

*please note these are indicative figures only and may vary as the year proceeds funding is allocated and utilised following the census which takes place three times per year.

The Pupil Premium for 2017-18 is allocated to schools with pupils on roll from January 2017 that is known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any time in the last six years. Each of these pupils will attract £1300. Schools will have the freedom to spend the premium, which is additional to the underlying schools budget, in a way they think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils.

Laithes Primary School will ensure that the targeted and strategic use of pupil premium will support us in raising attainment and achieving our vision.

Principles

At Laithes Primary we aim to ensure that:

- Teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils.
- That appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately addressed and assessed.
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged.
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate the pupil premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged. At least 70% of any group will be made up of FSM children.
- Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a need analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited resources and funding means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time.

Provision

The range of provision the Governors consider making for this group could include:

1. **Achievement and Standards** work including additional class based or intervention work to accelerate progress of targeted groups or individuals.
2. **Learning Support** to enable children to fully access learning and accelerate progress where there are specific barriers other than identified Special Educational Needs.
3. **Pastoral Work** which undertakes work to raise self-esteem, extend their personal skill set and support children to make appropriate choices in order to maximise learning opportunities.
4. **Out of Hours and Enrichment** to ensure that children are given a full opportunity to develop other talents in sport and creativity to also improve self- confidence and motivation for school.

All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving children to at least age expectations.

Pupil premium resources may also be used to target able children on FSM to achieve mastery within their national curriculum.

Reporting

It will be the responsibility of the Headteacher or delegated member of staff, to produce regular reports for the Governing Body on:

- The progress made towards narrowing the gap, by year group, for socially disadvantaged pupils.
- An outline of the provision that was made since the last meeting.
- An evaluation of cost effectiveness, in terms of the progress made by pupils receiving a particular provision, when compared to other forms of support.

The Governors of the school will ensure that there is an annual statement to parents on how the Pupil Premium funding has been used to address the issue of 'narrowing the gap', for socially disadvantaged pupils. This task will be carried out within the requirements published by the Department for Education and will appear on our school website.
